








Living the "Shahadah," Statement of Faith










"I testify that there is no deity except for the One True God, Allah, and I testify that Muhammad is the Messenger of God." The statement of faith by which a person enters Islam is the declaration of worshipping God exclusively and believing in the Messenger Muhammad as the model and example in devotion to God. This testimony is not a cliche, rather it is a code by which a Muslim should live and conduct themselves.









The Power of the Statement of Faith

This testimony is what separates a believer from a non-believer. It is upon this basis that God will ultimately judge people and decide who gains His reward or punishment. In making this statement, we acknowledge God's power, supremacy and perfection. We attest that He alone is the Creator, Provider and Sustainer of the universe, and thus, He alone is worthy of worship and devotion. We further acknowledge that we were created for the purpose of His worship and obedience.

In order to achieve this purpose of worshipping God alone and to do so in the manner He ordained, God sent to us a Messenger as a guide, and gave him the scripture that contains all we need to fulfil this testimony. God sent every people a Messenger as a guide and sent some of them scriptures. The last of these guides was the Messenger Muhammad. In the statement of faith, we accept him as God's final messenger, we believe in him and what he brought, and we follow his teachings and example in order to gain God's reward and favor.









What Happens after the "Shahadah"?

Once the declaration of the statement of faith is made, we become Muslims. The power of the testimony of faith is that we now have clarity as to what it is that we need to do in this life. We know what God has allowed and disallowed and therefore what gains His pleasure or anger. Islam means to submit to God's commands, so we live our lives in accordance with God's laws and teachings. 


Practicing Islam with Purpose






Seeking Knowledge in Islam
